KBOCC generally serves geographically isolated populations that have no other means accessing education beyond the high school level.

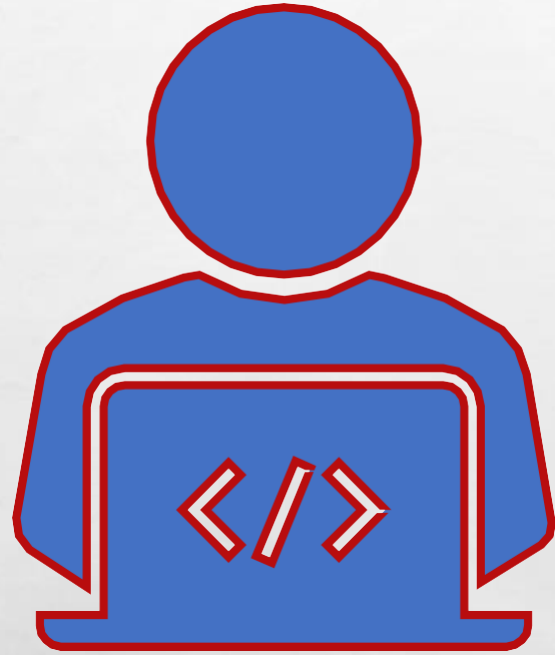

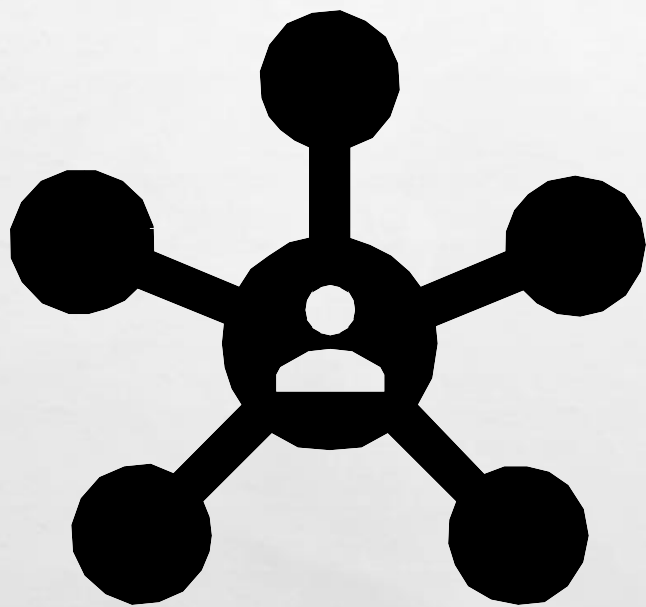

ACADEMIC PLACEMENT TESTS

All new students must take placement tests that measure three academic areas: **reading comprehension, sentence skills, and math**. These tests will determine in which level of math, reading or english you can enroll. The purpose is to place you into the correct level of courses so that you can learn the skills you need to be successful in all your future coursework.

STUDY FIRST!

Accuplacer offers a [study app](#) to help you prepare for the tests. You should download and use the app to improve your performance on the tests. Remember, the better you do on your assessment test, the fewer classes you may have to take!

WHERE AND WHEN?

Academic placement tests can be taken in the student success center or online. When you are ready to take your test, schedule with the tutor and remember: a valid ID card is required to take the assessment tests.

Dropping courses & Refund Policy

DROPPING COURSES

Registered students may drop courses through the end of the first week of the semester without a transcript notation by completing a drop/add form with instructor's and advisor's signatures and submitting it to the enrollment office.

REFUND POLICY

Tuition and fees will not be refunded for schedule changes following the drop/add period. This may be appealed in exceptional circumstances such as medical emergencies. If a class is cancelled, students will receive a full refund for that class.

TUITION AND FEES

TUITION AND FEES WILL BE ASSESSED ON THE NUMBER OF CREDITS FOR WHICH THE STUDENT IS ENROLLED AT THE END OF THE DROP/ADD PERIOD. THERE WILL BE NO TUITION REDUCTION FOR COURSES DROPPED AFTER THAT DATE.

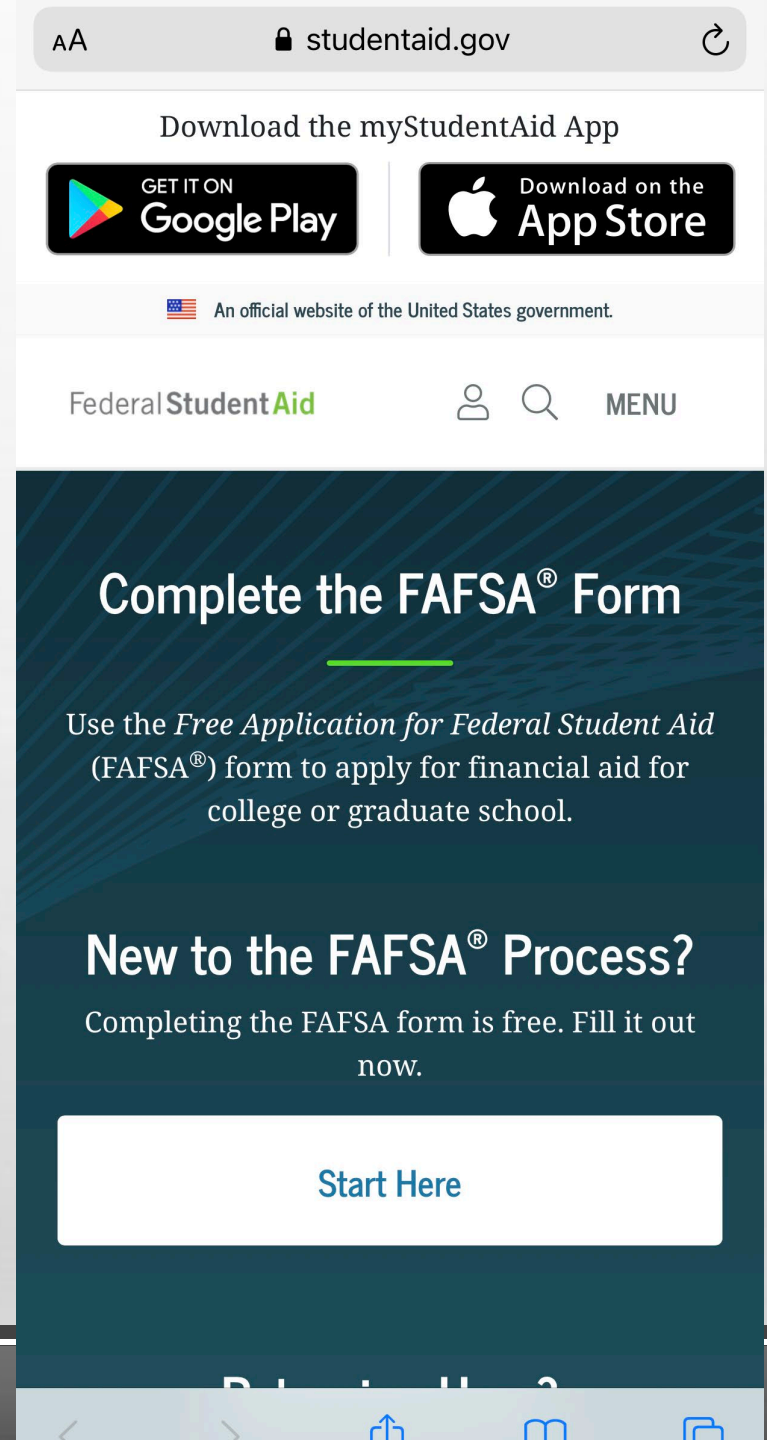

Bureau of Indian Affairs Grant Program

Native American students who are enrolled members may receive aid from the Bureau of Indian Affairs. To be considered for this grant students must contact their Tribal Education Office for a BIA Scholarship Application and to learn about other specific eligibility requirements.

Sovereign Fund

As determined by the Keweenaw Bay Indian Community (KBIC) Education Director, eligible KBIC members are considered for funding to help with the cost of books and supplies. Amounts vary based on course enrollment status as determined by KBIC.

TCU SCHOLARSHIP

Any KBOCC students who maintain 2.0 gpas may be eligible for fall and spring semester scholarships. Recipients and award amounts will be chosen based on financial need and individual scholarship requirements. ***Deadlines will be posted each semester.***

FULL CIRCLE SCHOLARSHIP

Native students and descendants can be considered for special scholarships as determined by the American Indian College Fund. Each scholarship has different requirements based on GPA, essay, and need. All students are encouraged to apply for the upcoming year; **the annual deadline for applying is May 31st.**

NEW*KBOCC Family Scholarship

KBOCC is now offering one free class to all KBIC tribal members, tribal descendants, and children of KBOCC or KBIC employees. Student's not eligible for other means of funding to cover their institutional costs are eligible for this scholarship.

NEW*Belote Family Scholarship for American Indian Women

Women of various cultural and ethnic backgrounds often face great obstacles to the fulfillment of their educational aspirations. This scholarship was established to help these worthy students gain knowledge and wisdom which they will use, in turn, to help others.

Elder Scholarship

Students ages 62 or older who are not eligible for other sources of financial aid can be eligible for a tuition scholarship through KBOCC for one course per semester. To be eligible for this scholarship, students should submit an Elder Financial Aid Application and provide proof of age.

Spirit of Sovereignty Scholarship

Established by the Native American Indian Gaming Association (NIGA) as an avenue to give back to tribal communities.

Timothy W. Shanahan Memorial Scholarship

The Timothy W. Shanahan Memorial Scholarship was created in memory of a dear friend who dedicated sixteen years of service as Chairman of the Board of Regents for KBOCC. One student will be awarded for this competition-based scholarship in recognition of the creative, outstanding, and positive impact on the community and commitment to excellence.

Hemlock Scholarship

1. Michigan Indian Tuition Waiver

The Michigan Indian Tuition Waiver is a program enacted by Public Act 174 of 1976, which waives the tuition costs for eligible Native Americans in public community colleges or universities within Michigan.

2. Frontliners for Future

Futures for Frontliners is a scholarship program that pays for you to attend your local community college tuition-free

3. Tuition Incentive Program (TIP)

The Tuition Incentive Program (TIP) encourages eligible Medicaid recipients to complete high school by providing tuition assistance during an eligible student's qualifying certificate or associate degree program and also during the student's bachelor's degree program.

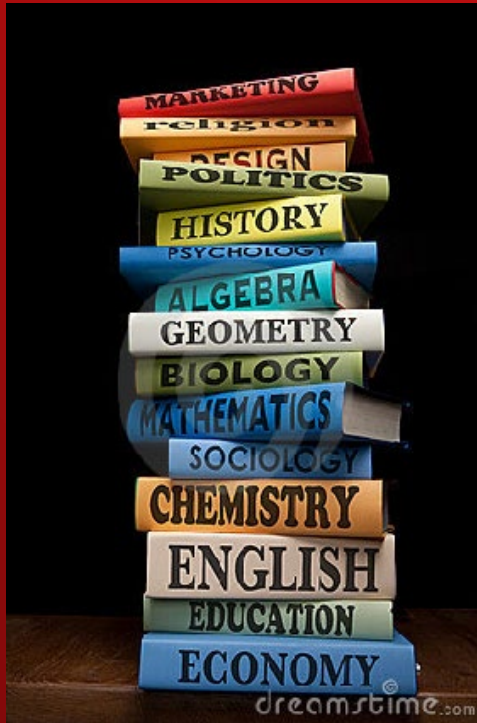

WHAT IS DEPRESSION?

Q. What causes depression?

Depression does not have a single cause. Several factors can lead to depression. Some people carry genes that increase their risk of depression. But not all people with depression have these genes, and not all people with these genes have depression.

A. Environment—your surroundings and life experiences, such as stress, also affects your risk for depression. Stresses of college may include: Feeling alone or isolated, experiencing conflict in relationships, facing new and sometimes difficult schoolwork, or worrying about finances.

Q. How can I find out if I have depression?

A. The first step is to talk with a doctor or mental health care provider.

30 percent of college students reported feeling “so depressed that it was difficult to function”

Signs and symptoms of depression

- *Sad*
- *Anxious*
- *Empty*
- *Hopeless*
- *Guilty*
- *Worthless*
- *Helpless*
- *Irritable*
- *Restless*

Take care of you.

Eat, sleep and be active. We don't often think about how important these basic activities are for our mental health – but they are critical.

Check In and get checkups.

We get check-ups for our physical health. We see our dentist to take care of our teeth. We even take our cars in for tune-ups. It's time to take responsibility and get check-ups for our emotional well-being. Talk with your doctor, a counselor, a faith based leader...and your family and friends to make sure you – and those you love – are doing well emotionally.

Engage and connect wisely.

Pay attention to your relationships. We can't be healthy if our relationships are not.

Relax.

Learn ways to reduce the stress that we all face – and practice what works for you: meditate, run, knit, dance, sing, write, love.....
